Background Information

- generally considered to be the earliest major work of English poetry
- dates to sometime between 700-1000 AD.
- composed in Old English (Anglo-Saxon)
- a great deal of mystery surrounds Beowulf- We do not know if it is the work of one poet, or descended from oral storytelling

Background Info (cont)

- Setting is actually in Scandinavia (today modern day Sweden and Denmark
- various elements of the story were probably passed down by scops, Anglo-Saxon storytellers
- Many aspects of the poem are fictional (the characters Beowulf, Grendel, Grendel's mother, etc.), but it does seem to have historical roots. The kings Hrothgar, Hygelac, and Onela were all real men.

The Poem

- over 3000 lines long
- written in an unrhymed four-beat alliterative verse

HWÆT, WE GAR-DEna in geardagum, peodcyninga prym gefrunon, hu ða æþelingas ellen fremedon! oft Scyld Scefing sceapena preatum,

LO, praise of the prowess of people-kings of spear-armed Danes, in days long sped, we have heard, and what honor the athelings won! Oft Scyld the Scefing from squadroned foes,

The Poem (cont)

- tells the story of a noble warrior who becomes King of the Geats.
- Divided into 3 parts:
 - Beowulf as a young warrior- fights Grendel and Grendel's mom
 - Beowulf's days as the ruler of the Geats.
 - Beowulf's final battle to protect his kingdom.

- The original manuscript is owned by the British Library in London.
- It was damaged in a fire in 1731.

 As a result, the pages are burned and brittle, and parts of them are illegible.
- There was no title included in the manuscript; it was added later by scholars.
