Background Information

John Steinbeck

- February 27, 1902-December 20, 1968
- Decided to be a writer at age 14
- Started college at Stanford University in 1919, but left before earning a degree
- Was married 3 times, and had
 2 sons



- Wrote 28 novels total
- Most famous works- Tortilla
 Flat, The Grapes of Wrath, East
 of Eden, and Of Mice and Men
- Focused on the life of migrant workers mainly in California, and on the strength and determination of the human spirit
- Received the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1962



"If you're in trouble, or hurt or need - go to the poor people. They're the only ones that'll help - the only ones."

Of Mice and Men

- Published in 1937
- Originally written as a play about the Great Depression; it was developed into an actual play soon after the book was published
- Both book and play were huge successes- Steinbeck earned the Pulitzer Prize in 1939
- Setting- 1930s during the Great Depression (2 locations- a stream close to the Salinas River, and a ranch near Soledad, California
