




POISONOUS DRINKS MYSTERY














A dead female body lies at the bottom of a multi-story building. It looks as though she committed suicide by jumping from one of the floors.

Agatha Christie

The Queen of Crime

- Born in <u>1890</u> in <u>Torquay</u>, England.
- Youngest child of an
 American father and British mother.
- She <u>did not attend formal</u> <u>school</u> because her mother disapproved of it, so she was largely <u>educated at home</u> <u>by her father</u>.











- She married <u>Archibald Christie</u>, an aviator with the Royal Flying Corps, in 1914, and in 1919, she gave birth to her only child, <u>Rosalind</u>.
- She was a member of the Voluntary Aid
 Detachment of the Red Cross, working as a
 <u>nurse</u> during <u>WW1</u>.
- Christie published her first book, <u>The</u>
 <u>Mysterious Affair at Styles</u>, in 1920, which introduced her readers to one of her most famous characters, the infamous <u>Belgian</u> detective, <u>Hercule Poirot</u>.







In 1926, on a cold December morning, Christie left her daughter with the maids and disappeared. Her mother had recently died, and she had discovered Archibald's relationship with a pro golfer, Nancy Neale. Her car was found abandoned the next day, and a nationwide search ensued. When Christie was found eleven days later in a hotel in Harrowgate, she had no recollection of who she was. She never spoke about the incident with family or friends.

- She divorced Archibald in 1928.
- One of her lifelong ambitions was to travel on the Orient Express. In the autumn of 1928, she took her first trip to Baghdad aboard the OE. From there, she traveled to the archeological dig site at Ur in Mesopotamia (modern day Iraq). She returned to the site the following year, where she met the young archaeologist, Max Mallowan, who she would marry in 1930. The two formed a bond over their love for travel, and they spent the rest of their lives adventuring together.









- That same year, Agatha Christie wrote the first full-length novel, <u>The Murder at the Vicarage</u>, featuring another beloved character, <u>Miss Marple</u>.
- In 1971, she was awarded England's highest honor, <u>Dame Commander of the Order of the</u> <u>British Empire</u>.
- She died in January 1976.









- Christie had a phenomenal literary career as a writer of crime stories. She wrote <u>66 detective novels</u>, as well as <u>14 short stories</u>, and <u>20 plays</u>, including the world's longest-running play, *The Mousetrap*. She has earned the titles the <u>Queen of Crime</u> and <u>Queen of Mystery</u>.
- Her book sales are only surpassed by <u>the works of</u> <u>Shakespeare</u> and <u>the Bible</u>. Her combined works have sold more than 1 billion (in English) and 1 billion (in translation)worldwide, making her the best-selling novelist of all time.







And Then There Were None

- Published in 1939
- To date, it remains the best-selling mystery novel of all time.
